

## About Millcreek Township School District

Located in a suburb of Erie, Pennsylvania, the Millcreek Township Public School district serves 7,000 students from kindergarten through 12th grade. **1,100 of Millcreek's students need special education.** To accommodate that population, it has nine autism support classrooms and 11 emotional support classrooms.

## **Challenges**

Restraint was a hot button issue for parents, and the district wanted to find a way to eliminate the practice. After going through a very challenging case that involved a student being restrained, Millcreek's Director of Pupil Services, Ed Nientimp, heard about Ukeru online and decided to attend a training at Grafton (Ukeru's parent organization in Winchester, Virginia). "I really went there as a skeptic," says Nientimp. "I had been trained in four different approaches to crisis management... but the comfort versus control approach really hit home for me."

"It took a little bit of convincing. But after the last training we did, a teacher came up to me to tell me how great it was. We are slowly winning people over by having them see it firsthand."

## **Working with Ukeru**

The district gained buy-in of staff by explaining how Ukeru would decrease injuries to staff and reduce workers' compensation cases.

Approximately 20 special education teachers have been trained in Ukeru, as well as 40 para-professionals, five principals, two school psychologists, and four guidance counselors. Ukeru was implemented in three of the highest-need classrooms in January 2017.

After the pilot, shields were ordered to support all autistic and emotional support classrooms. The following school year, **Ukeru expanded to 17 special education classrooms.** Millcreek has since implemented a policy that requires staff to utilize de-escalation and Ukeru prior to consideration of restraint.

## Results

- Before Ukeru, 47 students were restrained annually (2015-16 school year). After Ukeru was implemented, zero students have been restrained.
- During the first year of full implementation (2017-18), Ukeru was used 130 times with 16 students. Ukeru prevented the use of restraints 100% of the time.
- One year after implementing Ukeru, there were no student or staff injuries.
- Using Ukeru's trauma-informed approach has led to fewer time-outs and more students staying in the learning environment.
- Feedback from staff who have gone through Ukeru training has been overwhelmingly positive.
- The district is expanding its Ukeru program
  to other off-campus programs. It's also
  planning to train its general education
  teachers in trauma-informed care.
